
Help Wanted!!

Meet our Speaker: Steve Burchik "Compass and a Camera"

With a compass to direct him in his job as a forward observer and a personal camera to document his experiences—and keep him connected to his creative side—Vietnam veteran Steven Burchik was lucky enough to make it home and years later decided to write about the most challenging year of his life.

Like any experience, his year spent with the First Infantry Division stationed in the rice paddies near Saigon included good times as well as bad. He candidly recalls how, although he believed communism to be a serious threat in the world, he soon learned that a guerilla war is a difficult one to fight, and survival rather than victory quickly became his focus. But he also remembers the exhilaration of helicopter rides over serpentine rivers and the time he introduced village kids to a gumball machine.

A unique memoir of the war, this presentation pulls not only from Burchik's memories, but also from the daily letters he wrote to his fiancée (she kept every one) and includes numerous photographs.

At the San Francisco Police Academy last month, I was surprised when a young, fresh-faced cadet stepped up to me with a big smile and said "Do you belong to SIR? My grandpa belongs to that too" - he had spotted the proud rooster on my cap — but GRANDPA really?

Observing my grandkids' latest crazy behavior, something vaguely familiar tickles the back of my memory, and then comes tumbling out: I was just like them when I was a kid! - sometimes even worse. How did I not remember my pre-teen self when I was judging them?

Fellow SIR grandfathers, you and I are lucky. When we were fathers of young children, we felt obliged to teach them — to let them know the standards of behavior and encourage them forcefully to live up to them. Communication went pretty much one way — from us to them. But we don't have to do that now with these grandkids.

We can slow things down. We already know they won't sit still for "advice". To interact with them, we can choose to take a different approach Given time together, these kids may risk telling you about themselves. If their ideas seem naïve, unrealistic, you're not required to set them straight. It doesn't feel like doing anything, but there may be a reason we're still here; even those smart know-it-all grandkids are pretty funny, and I've gotten some of my best reading suggestions from my 17-year old granddaughter, in addition to privileged access to a world that we can barely imagine – the place where they live.
