Thoughts from Your Big SIR John McGlothlin: – Travel Broadens the Mind

September found us in France. Fitting, as we reflect on the U.S. entry into "The Great War" 100 years ago. Our bus rides around Paris and up and down the Loire river brought constant reminders of the struggles of France and especially those involving the United States.

Our first night in Paris brought us to the Bastille (a prison in 1789, today a stylish Symphony Hall). Signs on freeways surrounding Paris directed towards the Marne (scene of bitter battles at the start of the Great War). Another sign pointed to Chateau-Thierry, where the American Expeditionary Forces proved their mettle. Still another pointed towards Metz and Verdun, fortresses where German and French generals took turns

ordering troops to face withering fire.

We think of France as an ancient country since history recounts great kings as far back as the 700's. In reality, it took France almost 1,000 years to look like it is today as underscored by our travel along the Loire. At the mouth is Nantes, part of Brittany, an independent dukedom, through the 1500's. Much of the Loire Valley was controlled by England until the 1500's. The great Chateau of Chinon is an example of their power while the citadel at Angers symbolizes French might. You can follow the path of Joan of Arc up the Loire, from Chinon to Orleans as France threw off foreign domination.

One sign of nationhood is that chateaux became stately and less warlike. French kings were quite fond of their mistresses and what show better way to their appreciation than gifting а chateau. It goes without saying that a fancy chateau demands good food and wine and France may as well have invented both.

Back in Paris, there is more to learn. For instance, the towers of the Concierge, were where the nobility was "scheduled" for the guillotine during the revolution. You'll never think the same about the smiling person at your hotel.
