Wine Tasting, Bob Fox 415-753-2630. Lucky enough to come of age in San Francisco? You experienced Italian Restaurants. Tasty food with California's bounty enhancing. Seems every restaurant had their special wine; inexpensive, hearty and made even better by the food and surroundings. Red wines weren't labeled Zinfandel, Barbera, Cabernet, just burgundy, claret, chianti or red and came from vineyards planted with many varieties; "field blends". It was possible to go to wine shops and delicatessens and find these wines; Rege, Mazzoni, Pagani, Martini and Prati, Foppiano, Nervo, Cambiaso, etc. They disappeared, bought out by others, occasionally moving upscale. Surprise - pick up a \$40-\$50 bottle and see a vineyard name such as Nervo or Pagani proudly displayed; the vineyards survived with grapes now coveted by top-tier wineries. Think back to the day when a case of 4 gallons could be had for under \$20.00 (your editor).

- When you respond to emails THINK before using "reply all". Do you really want everyone to receive your response?
