Dave stated "May their memories be a blessing" before giving the invocation and leading the Pledge of Allegiance, and "God Bless America."

Tim called on our Activity Chairs for announcements and reports. Jack Major, Golf Chairman, described up and coming golf competitions and events. Charley Leach invited members to join the weekly competition at Doelger Center's Bocce court on the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Wednesdays each month. Local Travel Chair, Bill Gipe described future trips including a June gathering to hear the San Francisco Banjo Band at Molloy's Tavern in Colma. July's Geritol, Two Angel's, Lake County Petite Sirah. Recently our Geritol prize was made from a grape formerly called Gamay and now labeled Valdigue. This month's Petite Sirah is named for a grape that never really existed. In the 1800's, a spicy/peppery, robust red grape was imported and planted and made into wine in California. Some said it was a variant of the well-regarded Syrah from the Rhone area of France. Not really! The grape was Duriff, grown in the Rhone and not highly regarded. Like many immigrants to America, the Duriff (aka Petite Sirah) achieved more in the USA than in the "old country", grown throughout California. It also provided much needed color and body in wines made from Cabernet and Pinot Noir grapes especially in the days when only 51% of the named grape was required for labeling purposes. Today Petite Sirah is enjoyed as a full-bodied gutsy wine.

June's honoree is Rich Fraher. Rich is a proud native San Franciscan. He attended Riordan High School, working for Park and Recreation at Balboa Swimming Pool part-time. After graduation, Rich entered San Francisco State majoring in economics and minoring in math. Rich worked at Sears and Roebuck on Army Street in the Mission District to fund his college education.

Rich began a career in coatings at E. I. Dupont paint in South San Francisco. His first job at Dupont involved filling 850-pound paint drums, then he moved to the raw material purchasing department. Eventually, Rich became a project coordinator for multi-million-dollar paint programs at oil refineries, pulp and paper mills, chemical plants, and oil rigs. Rich's primary work assignment was located at Chevron's refinery in Richmond.

To stay closer to home and spend more time with his wife, Rich began working for Binks Manufacturing in South San Francisco; a company manufacturing low-and-high pressure manual and automatic spray guns and accessories. Responsibilities included the north coast sales territory. Most sales were conventional spray guns, airless sprayers, safety equipment, pumps and accessories. This job gave Rich the opportunity to see our beautiful coast while serving small and big businesses.

After many years manufacturing paint, inspecting industrial paint jobs, working quality control, and teaching people to properly use spray equipment, Rich earned his C 33 Painting and Decorating License. His own business led to a union job as a lead painter at Embarcadero Center until his retirement. Rich is now relaxing and enjoying life and joined our SIR Branch in November 2014. He is a regular attendee to our Branch 4 luncheon meetings and enjoys many friendships and our club's camaraderie.
