Geritol For January. We start the new year with a bright new wine, Beaujolais Nouveaux from Georges Duboeuf (aka the “King of Beaujolais”). Traditionally the first wine from the harvest and proof “*the vintage is the best since the last one*”. A juicy, frivolous red from the Gamay grape. Released each November and made to be enjoyed over the next few months. To be in Paris or Lyon when the wine is released, some of the wine is delivered in barrels; they say “three rivers flow into Lyon; the Rhone, the Soane, and the Beaujolais”. The Nouveaux we buy is a little heartier to stand shipping and handling. In a few months more conventional versions arrive, still fruity and a bit longer lasting, if you can wait!

"An Exceptional SIR"

Dr. David Barnett was born in Richland, Washington in 1933 (fun fact, SIR Bill McGee, Dave's son-in-law, was born in the same small town in Southeastern Washington) and was raised on a small farm in Richland, the youngest of five siblings. In 1951, Dave entered Washington State University to study veterinary medicine and was awarded his D.V.M. degree in 1957. From there he worked up and down the Bay Area and Central Coast on both large and small animals (the largest being primates at the San Francisco Zoo), before opening the Colma Animal Hospital in 1965.

During his nearly forty-year stint at the Colma Animal Hospital, he was active in the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), serving as president of both the Peninsula and the California Veterinary Medical Associations. He represented California in the AVMA House of Delegates for five years, and for six years was a member of the AVMA Executive Board, culminating in election as president of the 56,000-member National Conference in 1994.

In 1995, Dave received the Washington State University Alumni Achievement Award, recognized "for preeminence in the field of veterinary medical research and dedicated leadership in the AVMA." He was presented the award that year when he returned to WSU to speak at the College of Veterinary Medicine Richard B. Wescott Symposium. Dave sold his practice in 2004 and retired shortly thereafter.

In 1959, Dave married the love of his life, Joan Thomas. They first settled in South San Francisco where they had their three children - Pamela, Denise and Tom. In 1966 the Barnett's moved to Burlingame, where Dave has lived ever since. Outside of his practice, Dave was an avid tennis player, skier, hunter, and pilot. For many years he piloted family and friends in his Beechcraft Bonanza A36, including numerous trips to the Borrego-Anza desert where they maintained a vacation getaway. Dave is fairly new to Branch 4 but almost immediately jumped into action, with our group volunteering at the SF Food Bank. David truly enjoys our monthly luncheon meetings at the Basque Cultural Center.
